2009 AAVFD CONFERENCE IN THE SHOALS

The Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments celebrated its 32nd year at the beautiful Shoals Marriott Hotel and Spa in Florence AL. The annual event was hosted by the Lauderdale County Association of Volunteer Fire Departments.

Officers for the 2009-2010 year were elected. President Chauncey Wood, First Vice President William Neal, Second Vice President Lawrence Huffman, Third Vice President Steve Dennis, Secretary Mary Sells and Treasurer Otis "Butch" LeCompte.

Over 50 fire service vendors were on hand to display the latest innovations in equipment and protective firefighter gear. Over 40 fire pumpers and brush trucks were on display from Tennessee and Alabama, along with apparatus from the 14 Lauderdale County volunteer fire departments. Training sessions were also provided by the local and state EMA offices.

Events included the Firefighter Competition won by Fulton Volunteer Fire Department from Clarke County. Second place was captured by Johnson's Crossing VFD in Cullman County and Third place went to Thomasville VFD in Clarke County. Clements Volunteer Fire Department came out on top in the "Tug of War", with the men's and women's team winning both events. There were also events for children, including the Kid's Fire Safety Challenge course and Fire Safety House.

At the annual Awards Banquet, a special "Honoring our Heroes" ceremony was conducted by Mr. Ron Creel, Chief Executive Officer of the Alabama Sports Festival, in tribute to volunteer firefighters and EMS personnel who save lives and property in Alabama everyday. Each first responder with 10 years or more service was presented a Medal of Service and the families of those disabled or who died in the line of duty were presented the Medal of Sacrifice. Mr. Creel presented the Medal of Sacrifice to Ruby Gilbreath, widow of Double Springs Chief Michael Martin "Mike" Gilbreath, who died in the line of duty, as daughter, Amanda and son, Eric, stood with her.

Mr. James Daniel Day, Frisco City VFD in Monroe County, was honored as Fire Fighter of the Year. Chief Mary Hallman of Blue Springs VFD in Franklin County received the Sherry Garner Memorial Award, named in honor of the first female to die in the line of duty in Alabama. The President's Award was presented to Mr. Austin Roton of Alabama Printers in Montgomery in recognition of his personal and professional dedication to the AAVFD publication "The Volunteer".

The Muscle Shoals Music "Songwriters in the Round" featuring Mark Narmore, Phillip White and Noel Webster provided entertainment. Southern Accent rocked the pavilion at the Friday night cookout, with Nashville star Zak Hacker in concert following the Awards Banquet.

HJR11 ASSISTS VOLUNTEER FIREFIGHTERS' LEGISLATIVE AGENDA

In special session, HJR11 was approved by the Alabama Legislature and signed by Governor Bob Riley on August 14th. Sponsored by Representative Richard Laird, HJR11 declared that it was in the public interest and highly advantageous to insurance companies that volunteer firefighters of this state be permitted to finance a program establishing retirement benefits for retired volunteer firefighters.

A bill to establish an Annuity and Benefits program for volunteer firefighters will be presented by the Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments, Inc. in the 2010 legislative session.

"Volunteers have the bigger heart!"

Firefighters (volunteer and career) face new challenges every day, but the biggest is getting people "interested" and "committed" to volunteering.

Most of you came into the volunteer services in one of the two schools of thought. You were either seeking to help your fellow man (warm and fuzzy) or craving the exhilaration of running into a burning building...and then, helping your fellow man.

When you came into the department you were a "house on fire"; only where are you now? Do you still get that "rush", and if so, is it enough?

Volunteerism for all types of service is decreasing. We need to excite people about serving their fellow man and their communities. With funding sources drying up, everyone needs to commit to going back to the basics of taking care of our communities ourselves.

Seriously, I feel like the fire service has a huge target on its back. It seems to be open season on the volunteers, with the Heritage Foundation asking Congress to stop funding the Assistance to Firefighters Grant and the SAFER Grant programs, because it contends, the funding has not led to fewer firefighter deaths or injuries nor civilian deaths or injuries.

How wrong they are! Tell this to the firefighter who is wearing new turnout gear and a SCBA because his or her department received the funding. How about the firefighter who is now riding in an enclosed cab because a grant let the department get rid of old apparatus and get a new one! Aren't these firefighters safer? I would think so!

How about the civilian who was saved from a fire because a grant put more apparatus and firefighters on the scene for a first alarm? Is this civilian safer? I would think so!

Are you angry yet? I'm fuming! I just finished reading a 174-page document entitled "Assessing State Firefighter Cancer Presumption Laws and Current Firefighter Cancer Research", a study released by the National League of Cities, claiming there is inadequate scientific research to determine a link between firefighting and cancer.

The League went out and paid TriData, a consulting firm, to write the documents. I know firefighters, and probably many of you do also, who have come down with strange cancers with no family history. There is a link between chemicals on the fire ground and cancer, other than risk factors, such as smoking and tobacco use. Remember 9/11! Yet, we forget.

OK, I got that off my chest! With that, I would be remiss if I didn't mention the GREAT conference in Florence. Morris Lentz and his conference committee did an OUTSTANDING job, so a great big THANK YOU to everyone who worked so hard to make the conference such a success! The vendors who were in attendance, competition teams (Whew! Time for some Apple Pie!), the banquet, Shoals musicians, honoring Alabama's Heroes (firefighters and EMS), CEO Ron Creel's Medals of Service and Sacrifice ceremony, and entertainment after the banquet were superb!

In closing, I want to say a personal THANK YOU for electing me as your president of AAVFD for another year. It has been a great year, legislative and membership wise, for "our" association. The Legislative Special Session was a success. The Legislature stepped up to the plate and passed HJR11 to benefit our 903 department members. AAVFD membership, of course, reflects the hard work by many of you. I promise to work as hard as the past year, and I believe that together we can accomplish as much in the new year.

SENATOR HARRI ANNE SMITH PRESENTS CHECK TO FAYETTE VFD

(FAYETTE, ALABAMA)-State Senator Harri Anne Smith (R-Slocomb) presented a state grant check Saturday to the Fayette Volunteer Fire Department to keep the unit in operation for the next eighteen months. Senator Smith surprised the crowd when she gave a check for just under \$16,000 to Volunteer Chief Robert Herring in front of a crowd that gathered to raise funds for the FVFD at an afternoon cookout at the New Hinson Baptist Church.

Fayette's fire unit has depended on tobacco tax revenues to fund its operations, but that money has run out. Senator Smith attended the local fundraiser but kept her grant check a secret to surprise the attendees.

"Having grown up in Slocomb, I know what a volunteer fire department means to a small community. I am pleased to present this check to keep Fayette's fire service up and run-

ning for the next few months and hope you are successful here today in your own efforts," Senator said. Volunteer Fire Chief Robert Herring expressed gratitude to Senator Smith. "This means so much to our community, and we are indeed grateful that Senator Smith so willingly responded to this crisis," Chief Herring said. Senator Harri Anne Smith repre-

\$ COMMUNITY SERVICE \$ GRANTS AVAILABLE

During the 2009 Regular Session, the Legislature appropriated \$6.5 million to House members for community services grants from the State General Fund for Fiscal Year 2010. In the past, the grants have traditionally gone to education programs, but the Legislature expanded them to include non-education purposes. As a result, Volunteer Fire Departments will be eligible for the first time.

If your department would like to apply for a community services grant from the General Fund, please contact your local state representative. Permissible uses of these grants are included.

Thank you for your vote and confidence. Please call at any time if I can be of assistance.







Willis Speed Kastorff, in 1963, moved his family to the rural Bobo community in Madison County, Alabama, where he actively participated in the planning, construction, and implementation of the emergency fire and medical response system now in place in rural Madison County. He became involved in this effort in 1973 when he cofounded the Bobo Volunteer Fire Department Inc. He is a former president of the Madison County Association of Volunteer Fire Departments Inc. and was appointed by the Madison County Commission as the first rural Madison

County Fire Marshal.

He is a native of Mobile, Alabama, a Korean War veteran (1950-1953) and a 1956 graduate of the Southern Technical Institute (Now known as the Southern Polytechnic State University) located in Marietta, Georgia. He is a retiree of the Boeing Company (1995) where he was employed as a principal engineer. He applied his engineering skills to NASA programs conducted at the Marshal Space Flight Center in Huntsville, Alabama, beginning in 1963 with the Saturn/Apollo Program and ending with the International Space Station Program.

Madison County Association of Volunteer Fire Departments. Inc

(A History of Four Decades of Relentless Service)

This 270 page book contains a historical account of the Madison

County Association of Volunteer Fire Departments Inc. (MCAVFD). It documents the beginning, growth, consolidation and implementation of Alabama's premier countywide association of rural volunteer fire departments that provides fire protection and emergency medical response to rural citizens. This account also describes how the MCAVFD, through the years, related to the majority will of its member fire departments and conducted business with other organizations, agencies, and institutions as regards to identifying, planning, and implementing (in a spirit of cooperation) critical elements of the emergency fire and medical response system now in place in rural Madison County.

- How did the MCAVFD and County Fire Marshal become significant players in the development of the countywide 9-1-1 communication system?
- These and other events are addressed in chronological order and are supported by historical documents found in the Appendix.
- We are proud of our accomplishments in Madison County and want to share this adventure with you. We hope that some of the lessons we learned will be helpful to you.

CERTIFICATION UPDATE FROM THE ALABAMA FIRE COLLEGE ALLAN RICE, EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR

JPR Testing for Certification Courses that Require Skills

For many years the Alabama Fire College and the Department of Defense tested skills by having every

student pass every skill before processing and mailing the course certificate. In Spring 2007, Interim Director Wayne Murry interviewed representatives in other states and asked the Certification Division to develop a new process to test the job performance requirements or "JPR Testing".

"JPR Testing" is a process used by most ProBoard and IFSAC accredited entities to test a "sample" of the required skills. The "sample" of four standard and three unknown skills are chosen randomly by computer. The skills are tested on a designated day that is scheduled by the host department at the end of the course. The skills are tested using the current Alabama Fire College skill sheets that can be found on the AFC website. The students are given a copy of all of the skill sheets on the first day of class.

The evaluators in each skill station are trained by the Alabama Fire College staff prior to the start of the testing. Evaluators are individuals chosen by the host department but an evaluator may not test a skill that they instructed during the course. Alabama Fire College Certification staff members attend each JPR testing site to manage the records and oversee the process.

Piloting the new testing process began at the Alabama Fire College in the Fall of 2007. Three resident recruit schools were used as pilots for the process. Florence Fire Department and Auburn Fire Department were the first two career departments to pilot the JPR Testing process in the field.

Chief Buchanan, Chief of Training at the Florence Fire Department, stated that the JPR testing process has made his job as training officer easier by eliminating the testing of all skills. He feels that it has assisted in identifying weaknesses in training and that the students are more accountable for mastering the skills. Several recruits have commented on the fairness of the process and how the testing was a true measure of their training.

The Alabama Fire College is now asking for Volunteer Firefighter 160 courses to volunteer to pilot the JPR testing. For information call Larry Jarvis at 205-391-3749 or email ljarvis@alabamafirecollege.org.

CPAT Requirements

CPAT is not required for students entering the Certified Volunteer 160 course. CPAT is required for recruits entering Firefighter I/II training or certified volunteers entering the "Bridge" program. The CPAT form must be current on the first day of the Firefighter I/II course. Currently, the option to bridge from Certified Volunteer to Firefighter I/II is only available in resident recruit schools at the Alabama Fire

End of Block Testing

The Alabama Fire College began piloting "End of Block Testing" for Certified Volunteer 160 in 2009. As of September 2009, all Certified Volunteer 160 courses will be tested using the end of block format. Blocks I, II, and III must be taken and tested in succession. Should a student fail an end of block exam, they may enter and test the next block before successfully passing the prior block. However, the First Responder course, Hazardous Materials Awareness and Operations certification course, and all three firefighter block courses must be successfully completed before the student can be issued a Certified Volunteer 160 certificate.

Certification Scores by Email

Students in certification courses may now receive test scores by email. Prior to giving the certification exam, the test proctor will distribute a student information form. The student can check the name that will appear on the certificate, mailing address, and add or edit the email address to ensure that the scores and certificates are emailed and mailed to the correct location.



SHERRY GARNER MEMORIAL AWARD

Chief Mary Hallman of Blue Springs Volunteer Fire Department in Franklin County was honored as the 2009 female Firefighter of the Year. This award is named after the first female firefighter in Alabama to die in the line of duty.

Chief Hallman's dedication is personal, as well as a family tradition. Working with her parents, she was active in department fundraising before she was old enough to join the department.

Mary joined the fire department as soon as she could become an active firefighter. She soon became Assistant Chief; and then, was elected chief in 2005. The same year she was honored as Blue Springs Firefighter of the Year.

Mary's dependability goes way beyond everyday responsibility. She responded to a fire where a neighbor was sleeping when his house fire broke out. When he woke up on fire, he jumped into a pond. He called to Mary, saying he was going to drown! She jumped in, telling him she would not let him drown; he could float on her until help could get there.

Chief Hallman also responded to an emergency call for a man who was not breathing. She got him off the couch to do CPR. When he hit the floor, his heart started beating, but she continued CPR until he could be transported to the hospital. The doctors told him that he would not have survived if Mary had not done all that she did.

Chief Hallman has secured several FEMA grants for Blue Springs VFD. She got a grant for new department turnout gear and air packs. Her hard work also paid off big when the department received a grant for a new fire truck, with an

additional grant to equip the truck. Under her leadership, the department is working hard to improve their ISO rating. Assistant Chief Johnathan Ergle stated, "Chief Hallman is devoted and dedicated to her firefighting responsibility and position as chief, going beyond the call of duty to make sure her department is safe and effective. By doing so, she has gained the respect and trust of the people in this department and county."

Leroy and Glenda Olsen said, "One of the main things that we know about Mary is that she is always there to help everyone." Carolyn Vandiver voiced her support for Chief Hallman and all the Blue Springs Firefighters when she added, "We have great confidence in their efforts and ability and feel reassured that Mary Hallman is chief of our department."



FIREFIGHTER OF THE YEAR

For the past 20 years, James Daniel Day has served the fire service in Monroe County in many capacities going beyond the call of duty for his department and the state volunteer fire service. On August 1st, Daniel was honored as the 2009 Firefighter of the Year.

Captain Day is a member of Frisco City Fire/Rescue in Monroe County, also serving as training officer. He is a certification teacher in AED/CPR training. He has earned certification in First Responders, Extrication, Incident Command, Terrorism Awareness, EVOC, Life Flight Safety, Basic Pump Operations, Airport Firefighter I, Haz-Mat Tech and many more.

Chief Shannon Sawyer states, "Daniel sets high standards for himself and his department. He leads by example and encourages all personnel to do the same. His willingness to help other's is obvious to all around him 24/7." He is also an emergency disaster assistant volunteer with Monroe County OHS/EMA.

Effective Date: August 1, 2009

Act No. 2009-618 Subject: "Volunteer Fire Fighter Registration Fee Exemption"

Amended Code Section(s) 40-12-244 Provisions:

- Provides for one (1) registration fee exemption for a volunteer fire fighter who is a resident of Alabama and is entitled to a distinctive Fire Fighter license plate.
- Exemption only applies to Fire Fighter distinctive license plates.
- Documentation required:
 - Certificate currently required from the Alabama Forestry Commission signed by the applicant's fire chief with indication that applicant is a volunteer.
