ALABAMA FIREFIGHTERS ANNUITY AND BENEFIT FUND

A previously established Annuity & Benefit Fund for volunteer firefighters was declared unconstitutional over 20 years ago. The Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments (AAVFD) has worked diligently through the ensuing years to pass legislation to again institute this benefit for our firefighters, volunteers and paid.

President Chauncey Wood spent many hours steering SB299, which establishes this fund, through the legislative system. Many firefighters worked with him on this important recruitment and retention tool that gives one more tangible benefit to fire service members.

On April 30, 2010, history was made for a second time when Governor Bob Riley signed SB299, sponsored by Senator Roger Bedford, into law (Act # 2010-726).

Work on the details began October 25, 2010 when the first meeting of the Alabama Firefighters Annuity and Benefit Board of Commissioners was held in the AAVFD office in Montgomery. Members of the Board of Commissioners (by appointment) are:

Reid Vaughan - Alabama Firefighters Association Robert Ezekiel - Alabama Association of Fire Chiefs Dale Wyatt - Professional Firefighters of Alabama Charlie Dixon - Governor Bob Riley, State of Alabama This fund will provide retirement, disability, and death benefits to its members. Any firefighter who is actively serving a department in the State of Alabama may join the fund and may remain a member as long as they continue to serve.

The Commissioners are currently compiling a record-keeping method to establish a data base of eligible participants and the method used by firefighters to become members of the fund. Information about the Fund can be found elsewhere in this issue. A tri-fold with detailed information will be sent to all departments around the first of the new year.

Mrs. Sandra Mott served as Temporary Executive Director until Mr. Milton Parsons came on board as Executive Director. At this time, he can be contacted through the AAVFD office.

AAVFD is ready, willing and able to work with Governor-Elect Dr Bentley and the Legislature. **OUR** legislation for 2011 is prioritized and ready to be pre-filed before the regular session begins March 1st.

The extraordinary December 8, 9, 10, 13, 14, 15 & 16, 2010 session was successful in strengthening our ethics laws. AAVFD Fire Caucus Chair Representative Richard Laird introduced HB8 to amend our Annuity and Benefit Fund to include a voluntary check-off contribution on the Alabama Income tax form. This and three other bills introduced did not come up at all since ethics was a priority. Hey, I tried! It will be re-introduced in March.

In closing, I have faith THAT **OUR** Association is going to accomplish great things in the future, if we stick together as a team. "Together Everyone Achieves More!"

It's my prayer that each of you and your families enjoy good health and be safe and prosperous in the New Year. May God continue to bless **OUR** Association!

Each year, the Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments offers an AD&D insurance policy to its members. Enrollments have been sent to each AAVFD member department and coverage for the new year begins January 1, 2011.

Coverage of \$10,000 for a death in the line of duty/\$5,000 for 24-hr a-day coverage, plus \$50 per day disability for

line of duty injuries are \$12.00 per year. The \$20 policy doubles these benefits.

Frisco City VFD, Monroe County, conducted a blood drive through the Red Cross on October 30th.


Turkey Heaven VFD, Cleburne County, sponsored a Turkey Shoot on November 6th with all proceeds going toward providing fire protection in the District.

ALABAMA FIRE SERVICE ANNUITIES & BENEFITS

After many years of effort, the Alabama Fire Service has an Annuity and Benefit fund for the dedicated fire service members of this state. Any firefighter who is actively serving a department in the State of Alabama may join the fund and may remain a member as long as they continue to serve. This fund will provide retirement, disability, and death benefits to its members. Please take a few moments to look over the FAQs included below:

Who is eligible to participate? Any person who is a member in good standing of a bona fide volunteer fire department (Section 9-3-17 Code of Alabama 1975/Certified by the Alabama Forestry Commission) or who is currently employed by a paid fire department in the State of Alabama (certified by the Personnel Standards Commission or currently working to receive certification). (All members will be required to maintain 30 hours of continuing education per year as prescribed by Code of Alabama 1975 Section 36-21-180-197 in order to participate in the fund and remain in good standing.)

Do I have to be certified to be a member of the Annuity and Benefit Fund? No, Volunteer Firefighters can either hold certification as through the Alabama Personnel and Standards commission as such, or be listed on the registry of eligible firefighters that will be maintained at the Alabama Fire College for all non certified volunteers. All paid firefighters are required to be certified or working toward certification and their status will be certified by the Alabama Fire College as well.

What is the cost of participation? Each person who meets the criteria for initially becoming a member of the fund will be charged a onetime fee of \$20.00 to establish their account. Each member of the fund will remit \$20.00 by the tenth of each calendar month thereafter until the period specified by the law is met.

What is the length of time a member must pay into the fund before they are vested? What is the length of time before a member has earned maximum benefits under the fund? A member who has 25 years of qualified service in the fund and has met all other requirements of the law is entitled to maximum benefits from the fund.

Do I have to participate in the fund? No, Participation in the fund is entirely elective on the part of a firefighter. **When will I be able to collect my retirement benefits?** Any member shall, at any time after reaching the age of 62 and completion of at least 25 years qualified service, will be entitled to an annuity benefit.

What is "qualified" service? A member must continue to serve in a paid or volunteer position as a firefighter in the State of Alabama, meet the 30 hour minimum training requirement established by Alabama Law 1975 Section 36-21-180-197, and remit \$20.00 per month to the fund. Prior service may be purchased within two years of joining the fund at a price to be determined by the funds actuary.

If I decide to leave the fund do I lose all my money? Yes. Any member can withdraw from the fund. Once the forms have been accepted by the board the withdrawing member will receive 90% of the amount they originally placed in the fund. There will be no interest or additional benefit paid. If a firefighter takes this option and later wishes to rejoin the fund they will do so as a new member and there will be no credit given for prior service. A member who ceases to be a firefighter, may elect not to receive a refund and instead leave their total amount in the fund. However, the member may only do this for 36 months, and if the member has not been employed or accepted by a fire department the total of his or her fees will be returned to them.

What are the benefits for firefigthers that are disabled? Any member who becomes totally or permanently disabled as a result of a heart attack or any injury received in the line of duty as a firefighter, not as a result of his or her misconduct, shall be eligible for benefits by filing the appropriate forms with the board. The member making the claim may be required to submit to a medical examination by one or more physicians selected by the board at the expense of the board. Benefits paid for disability shall not be paid for more than 24 months. Benefits will be paid on the following scale:

Members who do not have more than 35 months of qualified service will receive \$72.00 per month.

Members who have at least 36 and not more than 47 months of qualified service will receive \$108.00 per month.

Members who have at least 48 and not more than 59 months of qualified service will receive \$144.00 per month.

Members who have 60 months or more of qualified service will receive \$180.00 per month.

ENTERPRISE VOLUNTEER FIRE DEPARTMENT WINS 2010 GEORGIA-PACIFIC BUCKET BRIGADE™ GRANT

Every day, millions of people count on volunteer and rural community fire units to protect them and their property. More than 825,000 volunteer and small town firefighters do their jobs mostly without recognition and often without the latest equipment or training.

The Enterprise Volunteer Fire Department has won a 2010 Georgia-Pacific Bucket Brigade™ grant. Chosen from more than 120 applicants in Georgia-Pacific facility communities in 23 states, the unit will receive \$5,000 to purchase new turnout gear.







CHICKEN HOUSE FIRE KILLS 5,000 CHICKENS AAVFD FIRST VICE PRESIDENT AND LUVERNE FIREFIGHTER WILLIAM NEAL

The weekend of October 9-10th, 2010 was the Alabama Fire College Weekend. Luverne Volunteer Fire Department (LVFD) sent six men to the Fire College. This cut into our first-out firemen available for a response. Many of our firemen work out of town or even out of country on oil rigs. The Fire Chief was leaving for Saturday evening, but I felt there were enough men to handle most calls.

I had just got off from work and walked into the house around 8:45 pm. A fire call was paged out at 8:59 pm for a brush fire on Patsburg Highway. I live only three blocks from the station. I started to the station and heard Lt Lee Simmons go en route with Brush Trucks 1 & 3.

I went to the station intending only to make out the report. Upon pulling into the back parking lot, I heard a fireman transmit "It is really a big brush fire!" The fireman, Mike Beck, lives about 2.5 miles from the reported location.

When I walked into the station, only myself and one other fireman was present. A few minutes later, it was transmitted by the first fireman on the scene that it was not a brush fire but a fully-involved chicken house fire. The initial firemen responded with brush trucks and Wildland turnout gear.

Lt Lee Simmons was on scene at 9:07 pm and requested tanker support immediately. Myself and the one other fireman in the station responded with one pumper and our tanker. I did a quick head count. All the available firemen were either on scene or en route. I immediately requested Brantley VFD dispatch a pumper to cover Luverne's station. Lt Simmons requested assistance from N.E.C., Goshen, Glenwood, Rutledge and Fullers Cross Roads VFDs. The old saying "Murphy's Law" was alive and well.

Upon arrival Lt Simmons had deployed units and a decision was made to abandon the chicken house itself because the roof had already fallen in on a considerable portion of the 400 X 50-foot building. I was driving the tanker. I knew where the closest hydrant was. I did not assume command but advised Lee to continue directing the incoming units. I took LVFD tanker to the refill hydrant about a mile away. I returned to find LVFD E-522 having serious drafting problems. I was able to direct another LVFD member to the tanker.

I checked with Lt Simmons and Lt McManigle; both were doing a good job of coordinating all of the incoming fire units. They had positioned units to stop the brush fires that had started to spread out. The primary effort was to stop the fire at the egg house that connected to the other 400-ft-long chicken house. I did a PAR check with chiefs from all five VFDs. All personnel were accounted for.

The problem of draft with LVFD E-522 persisted, and Rutledge E-517 replaced E-522. All departments handled their areas of assignment. A second drop tank was set up on the opposite end of the chicken house. After about two hours, the decision was made to start releasing units. A total of five engines, three brush trucks and three tankers spent nearly 2.5 hours on scene. There were at least 40 fire-fighters from five departments participating in the firefighting operation.

When LVFD returned to the station, firefighters started checking out E-522 to try to determine what was causing our drafting problem. A new probationary member found a 6.0 inch "O" ring on the ground and wasn't sure what it went to when LVFD picked up lines. We checked, and guess what! The "O" ring in one of our 6-inch suction lines was missing. "Murphy's Law" had gigged us twice that night. The ring had fallen out during the hooking up of suction lines in the dark, and no one noticed it.

The chicken house was a layer house with 4,500 hens and 500 roosters. It had been built in 1976. The worker who attended the house told me for the past two months, a breaker in the electrical box had been tripping on a regular basis.

LVFD returned on Sunday afternoon for a re-kindle in the egg house area. The second house was not damaged.

A Special Note on Pre-Planning: Three years ago, three of the five VFDs that responded to this fire cost-shared two fire hydrant installations at strategic locations in this area. The hydrant had been installed across the road from a milepost about a mile from the fire scene on US Highway 29. It was easily accessible by a farmer's barn. Prior to this, the nearest hydrant would have been four miles away.



HONORING THOSE WHO SERVE AT THE WASHINGTON COUNTY BANQUET

The Washington County Volunteer Fire Association held its annual dinner and awards banquet Oct. 2 at the Chatom Community Center.

Chauncey Wood, president of Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments was the guest speaker for the night as the association named its award winners for 2010.

Ricky Johnson, WCVFA president, said he would like to thank everyone for what they do in their communities.

"I would like to thank each volunteer and their spouses for what you do for this county," Johnson said. "We do more for our county as a volunteer than what people get paid to do."

The 2010 awards were presented awards to several individuals and departments.

Washington County Association of Volunteer Fire Departments presented the Ronnie Brown E.M.S. Award to Damon Kirkland of Red Creek Volunteer Fire Department; presented the Donnie Stallworth Firefighter of the Year for 2010 to Matthew Young of Fruitdale Volunteer Fire Department; presented the Fire Officer of the Year to Joe Smith of St. Stephens Volunteer Fire Department; presented the Dewey Reynolds Chief Award to Judy Ard of Fruitdale Volunteer Fire Department, and presented the Department of the Year to each Fruitdale and McIntosh Volunteer Fire Departments.

Wood said the volunteers in Washington County place their lives on hold to help people they may not even know in their comunities.

"I know we love what we do," Wood said. "We excel in what we train to do. We are leaders who inspire others to do and be responsible. I love each of you in this room. We are like family and tonight my message is about unity."

"Look around this room and you see that all of you represent Washington County. Continue to do what you do and don't give up. Remember what you are doing because the reason is because you love your community. It's not because you want a radio on your hip or a Maltese cross on your chest. It's your commitment to your community."

In 2009, seven bills spearhearded by the state association of VFDs passed and were signed into law, Wood said. The 2010 session saw 13 bills passed and signed into law.

"Since becoming your president two years ago, our association has had 20 fire service bills passed," he said. "It took a lot of persistence and diligence by many talented people to complete our legislative agenda."

Currently, the state association of VFDs is working a bill to present to the House and Senate for fire and rescue to departments to become tax exempt, Wood said. A rough draft has been formed and will be presented in December before the March 1 deadline.

Wood informed the fire departments that with more than 1,000 departments and more than 30,000 firemen, the county organizations make up the third largest organization in the state.

Woods thank each volunteer represented for their service in Washington County.

The Orange Beach Professional Firefighters Association Local 4309/Pink Heals Event Committee hosted the only visit of the "Pink Heals Tour" in Alabama. The goal of the event was to raise awareness and provide support for those affected by breast cancer.

During the Pink Fire Truck Parade, a firefighter was held "hostage" on the roof until 300 women signed up for cancer screenings. Free Medical screenings and wellness advice for women were only a few of the highlights.

During October, businesses were encouraged to "Turn Baldwin County PINK" by advertising, displaying and wearing pink in this honor. Several Fire Department members wore PINK uniforms to show their dedication to this cause.
