AAVFD SERVES IN INAUGURATION

Since William Wyatt Bibb took the first oath of office on November 9, 1819, in the temporary capitol of Huntsville, fifty-one men and one woman have been inaugurated as governors of the state of Alabama.

Governor-Elect Robert Bentley requested that the Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Departments (AAVFD) Honor Guard and Volunteer Firefighters in red-coats assist in coordinating inaugural activities on January 17, 2011.

The inauguration of the State's Elected Officials was a family-friendly event. The day began with a prayer breakfast. The inaugural parade started at 9:45 am on Montgomery's main street, Dexter Avenue, with AAVFD personnel escorting the elected officials to the

platform as they arrived in their parade vehicles. The state capitol building served as the backdrop for the ceremonies where the officials took their oath of office as the public viewed the proceedings.

Inaugural celebrations began at 2 pm at the Montgomery Biscuits Baseball Stadium. It included free food, music, inflatables for children, photo opportunities and remarks from Governor Bentley and concluded with fireworks. Each elected office holder hosted a reception for the many Alabamians in attendance.

Inauguration day wrapped up with the inaugural ball at 7 p.m. at the Renaissance Hotel in downtown Montgomery.

The year 2010 is now in the record books. With the start of a new year comes a time of re-dedication. (The above verse is one of my favorites. I keep it on my desk in front of me to remind me to act now, not tomorrow or next week!)

You have a responsibility to your community and the people who live there. Review last year's programs and see what was accomplished. Have your fire calls diminished? Are dollar losses due to fire decreasing? Can you speak with pride about your fire protection efforts? No?!?! Then it is time to make a change, to have a fresh commitment and a new direction. ACT NOW! Remember, it is your family, your friends, your neighbors and your community. Start by doing what is necessary; then, what is possible..... Hey! Before you know it, you're doing the impossible (St Frances of Assisi).

As firefighters, we are committed to saving lives and property! Firefighter deaths were below 100 for a second year. Line of Duty Deaths (LODD) rates show a decline from 90 fatalities in 2009 to 87 on-duty firefighter fatalities in 2010, which is a 6% decrease. "Everyone Goes Home" has had a positive reflection in the past two years. 2011 LODD through March 1st are 9.

By the time you read this message from me, the 2011 Alabama Legislative Session will be well under way, and with the legislative goals set by OUR Association, it looks to be a busy session again. A lot of my time is spent these days meeting, talking and explaining OUR legislation to the freshmen House and Senate members, asking them to join the RCFPI Fire Caucus and for support of fire service legislation.

During this regular session, the legislature will be facing some tough deci-There are no more stimulus monies, and that puts Alabama in a real bind. When you consider that education has to be a priority for state leaders and is critically important to OUR future (Alabama Fire College), I wonder what will happen.

The Alabama General Fund, however, is a different story. It is worse off than the education budget. We can look for another round of proration, layoffs or furloughs of our many state employees, and possibly, the complete elimination of some state agencies and departments. The General Fund is where **OUR** line-item funds and grant monies are located.

To maintain current levels of service requires \$700 million. It will be difficult to choose between reducing health care for the poor or releasing prisoners on one hand, and cutting other needed governmental services on the other. This WILL BE a very problematic and tough session for all concerned.

With that being said, I ask that you read carefully the below message from State Forester Linda Casey!

Stay safe, be proud of what you do, and try to make a difference when you can. May God Continue to Bless OUR Association.

To: Alabama Association of Volunteer Fire Department Members

I need to let you know of a crisis which the Alabama Forestry Commission (AFC) faces today and describe what you can do to help us avoid a catastrophic reduction in our ability to protect Alabama's forests. The AFC and members of the AAVFD across the state work in partnership every hour of every day to protect the forest and homes of landowners and homeowners.

Over the past several years, the Forestry Commission has taken extraordinary measures to reduce our operating costs in the face of steadily declining revenue. We have not purchased new equipment or made any capital improvements for five years. In the last 16 months we have reduced the number of people employed by AFC from more than 334 to 263, a reduction of more than 20 percent. With our reduced staffing levels, coupled with periods of high fire occurrence, we do not have the personnel to provide landowners with adequate fire

The Governor's recommended 2012 State General Fund (SGF) budget for the Alabama Forestry Commission is \$7,700,000. This is a reduction of \$4,300,000 from the 2011 SGF budget. A reduction of this magnitude combined with projected losses in federal funds and stagnant or declining severance tax collections, will result in further cuts in personnel.

The magnitude of personnel cuts would result in many counties having little to no forest fire protection. Additionally, all services with the exception of firefighting would have to be eliminated. We will reach a point where we cannot respond to many wildfires, resulting in fires which destroy tens of thousands of acres of forest land along with homes and other structures.

If our 2012 General Fund budget is significantly reduced, additional pressure would be put on AAVFD members who are responding to fires and our ability to continue the Federal Excess Property Program would be jeopardized. I'm asking on behalf of all AFC employees for your support and help. Please call, write, or visit your local legislators and ask them to keep AFC's general fund appropriation for FY2012 at the same level as the current fiscal year. We expect the Legislature is already considering the FY2012 budgets so any contacts need to be made as soon as possible.

The ability of the Forestry Commission to provide even the most basic services is at stake. I hope you will join many of your fellow members who are already making contact with legislators and other leaders in state government. Thank you in advance for helping in this most important effort.

AUXILIARY HELPS PIKE ROAD FIREFIGHTERS, COMMUNITY BY MATT OKARMUS – DECEMBER 29, 2010

While members of the Pike Road Volunteer Fire Department donate their time to help the community, they also have a group established to help the firefighters when they need it.

The Pike Road Fire & Rescue Ladies Auxiliary was established in April 2009, and its members have worked to help not only firefighters but also the community. President Debbie Green said the group's goal is to bring people together.

"We are a group that got together to bring about sister-hood while also promoting brotherhood," Green said. The auxiliary is made up of wives, mothers and friends of the firefighters and includes 15 active members. While they generally help out in the community, the women also arrive at the scene of fires.

"We provide water, Gatorade and other refreshments to the firefighters," Green said. "We want the guys to know they have somebody looking out for them."

Green's husband, Mike, is the fire chief. He has worked with the department for three years, and they have lived in Pike Road for 14 years.

Green hopes the auxiliary helps bring the community together.

"We want to bring a closeness and a more family oriented atmosphere," Green said. "We want to encourage

goodwill and friendships."

The women have sponsored fundraisers and have checked on families that might be in need.

A hit fundraiser for the department was "Rescue Me," a cookbook made up of recipes from women of the auxiliary. Green said the book has 17 sections and more than 450 recipes.

The auxiliary also sponsored a family for Christmas, which Green hopes to do each year.

Just before Christmas, Santa and Mrs. Claus rode in a firetruck up to the house of Dorothy Kiser and brought her children presents such as makeup kits and skateboards.

"The kids had no idea it was happening, and they were so excited when they saw Santa," Kiser said. "I am so thankful for those in the community that help out."

Amanda Moore, who has been an auxiliary member since May, also went to the house to see the kids enjoy their gifts.

She joined the group in support of her husband, Rescue Chief Ryan Moore, and said she likes being a part of a group that supports the community and the people who help protect it.

"We want them to know that when they leave, they have people back home supporting them," Moore said.





2011 AAVFD Legislation



- SB119 Senator Arthur Orr PROCEEDS FROM FOREITURE OF PROPERTY: Authorize the
 circuit court to distribute proceeds from forfeited property to a fire department or a volunteer fire
 department that participates in the investigation or seizure of controlled substances (meth labs,
 haz mats, etc)
- 2. SB129/HB243 Senator Gerald Dial Representative John Merrill AL FIREFIGHTERS
 ANNUITY AND BENEFIT FUND: Allow a minimum voluntary \$2 income tax contribution by check off of annual income tax returns. (Voluntary Check Off # 2 @ top following Alabama Child Abuse)
- 3. <u>SB130/HB213 Senator Tom Whatley Representative Richard Laird APPOINTMENT TO AL FIREFIGHTERS' PERSONNEL STANDARDS AND EDUCATION COMMISSION:</u> Authorize one member of the 7-member Commission to be appointed by AAVFD. Currently AFA and PFFA have one appointment each, and the Governor has 4 appointments. The State Fire Marshal is a member by virtue of his office. This would reduce the Governor's appointments to three.
- 4. <u>HB201 Representative John Merrill AL FIREFIGHTERS ANNUITY AND BENEFIT FUND:</u>
 Amend to provide for a voluntary annual fee (\$3), less an administration fee (not to exceed 3% of revenues remitted to fund), on each property and casualty insurance policy issued.
- 5. HB205/SB280 Representative Randy Wood Senator Bryan Taylor -SPRINKLER SYSTEM PERMITS: Allow State Fire Marshal to issue permits to certified potable water single family dwelling fire protection sprinkler contractors.
- 6. <u>HB331- TAX EXEMPTION Representative Richard Laird:</u> Provide sales tax exemption (excluding school taxes) for AAVFD and County Volunteer Fire Associations, AL Association of Rescue Squads, County Rescue Squads and Fire Districts that do not come under the auspices of their County Commission.
- 7. <u>HB390/SB355 SOLID WASTE DISPOSAL FEE EXEMPTION Representative Elaine Beech Senator Marc Keahey:</u> Exempt any volunteer fire department in this state from the payment of any fees required for solid waste disposal service by the county.

AAVFD continues to monitor legislation that can/will affect the volunteer fire service, such as Worker's Comp, Telecommunications, or other issues.

CONGRESS APPROVES FISCAL YEAR 2011 SPENDING BILL

On Thursday, April 14th the House of Representatives approved H.R. 1473, the Fiscal Year Department of Defense and Full-Year Continuing Appropriations Act, by a vote of 260-167. The bill funds the federal government through Fiscal Year 2011, which ends on September 30, 2011. The Senate approved the bill by a vote of 81-19.

Included in the bill is funding for several programs of interest to the fire and emergency services, including the Assistance to Firefighters (FIRE) and Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) grant programs. FIRE and SAFER were funded at a combined total of \$810 million, the same amount as Fiscal Year 2010 and \$200 million more than the Obama Administration's request for Fiscal Year 2011. The programs are funded at an equal amount of \$405 million each. The State Homeland Security Grant Program and the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) were funded at \$725 million each, a combined reduction of \$387 million from FY10 and \$700 million below the Administration's request for FY11.

The bill has been signed by President Obama.

From the Office of State Fire Marshall Ed Paulk

One hundred twenty-two men, women and children died in fires in the state of Alabama in 2010. This is the highest number of fire fatalities since 1997. The vast majority of these fatalities were in residential occupancies. This is a record that we are not proud of and one that we must address. We cannot require the installation of fire sprinkler systems in homes, which admittedly would dramatically reduce this number, and even if we could it would be in new construction, therefore it would be 20 years before we could expect significant improvement because most fire fatalities occur in older properties.

We must educate people to be responsible for their safety and change their outlook and the way they approach life. In today's environment we must always be aware of where we are, the ways to ensure our safety by knowing at least two ways to escape our surroundings. We must change our habits to practice fire safety in our daily lives thereby improving conditions in and around our homes. We must develop an emergency response plan and practice that plan. We cannot wait until an emergency happens and expect to have time to develop a plan to save ourselves and our family. We react to emergency situations properly when we have a plan that we have practiced. Join me in helping our fellow citizens learn about safety, let's give of our experience and help with the formulation of emergency plans and promote the training to give our plans meaning.






