

"Desperate times call for desperate measures" as the U. S. Congress is trying to identify spending cuts in the Federal budget. The Congressional Fire Service Institute (CFSI) is focusing on recruitment, retention, Homeland Security, health and safety. Times are, simply put, desperate.

CFSI, along with the National Volunteer Fire Council (NVFC), recently discussed strategic planning at length. There are ten priorities, which are:

- 1. Assistance to Firefighters Grant Program
- 2. Public Safety Officer's Benefit Reform*
- 3. Nationwide Broadband Communications Network (H.R. 607/S.911)
- 4. Volunteer Emergency Services Recruitment and Retention Act (H.R. 376)
- 5. Volunteer Responder Incentive Protection Reauthorization Act (S. 933/H.R. 2353)
- 6. Volunteer Firefighter and EMS Job Protection Act
- 7. U.S. Fire Administration
- 8. Fire Sprinkler Incentive Act (H.R. 1792/S. 1035)
- 9. Supporting Emergency Responders Volunteer Efforts Act (S. 932/H.R. 2488)
- 10. Good Samaritan Volunteer Firefighter Assistance Act


CONTRIBUTIONS OF SMOKEY BEAR RECOGNIZED BY GOVERNOR BENTLEY

ALABAMA FALLEN FIRE FIGHTER MEMORIAL CEREMONY HELD OCTOBER 1, 2011

The Alabama Fallen Fire Fighter Memorial Weekend was held at the Alabama Fire College in Tuscaloosa AL on October 1st. This ceremony brings together members of the fire service and the family and friends of the fallen in the line of duty. No fatalities were recorded for the year 2010. The name of Chelsea Lynn Garvin who died in 2005, member of Fish River Marlow VFD in Baldwin County, was added to the Fallen Fire Fighter Memorial. While participating with the department during the annual Fish River Boat Flotilla Christmas Parade, Miss Garvin died when the Jet Ski on which she was a passenger collided with a large boat.

Seventy-two fire fighters who died in the line of duty in 2010 were honoured during the National Fallen Fire fighters Memorial Weekend in Emmitsburg, MD, on October 15-16. Seventeen fire fighters who died in previous years were also honoured. These first responders made the ultimate sacrifice for their communities, and we shall be forever indebted to them for their service.

CONGRESS APPROVES YEAR-END SPENDING BILL

On Saturday, December 17, the Senate approved H.R. 2055, a \$915 billion spending package for Fiscal Year 2012. The bill, which includes funding for the Department of Homeland Security (DHS), was approved by the House on December 16th.

The spending measure makes significant cuts to DHS, funding the department at \$39.4 billion, a decrease of \$2 billion from FY11 and \$8.6 billion less than was requested by the Obama Administration. The Assistance to Firefighters (FIRE) Grant Program and the Staffing for Adequate Fire and Emergency Response (SAFER) Grant Program are funded at \$337.5 million each, down from \$405 million each in FY11.

FIRE and SAFER were not the only grant programs to be significantly cut in the bill. H.R. 2055 creates a funding pool of \$1.35 billion for a dozen grant programs, including the Urban Area Security Initiative (UASI) and the State Homeland Security Grant Program (SHGP). These programs will be funded at the discretion of the Secretary of Homeland Security.

The United States Fire Administration is funded at \$44.038 million, down \$1.5 million from FY11.

The bill now goes to President Obama for his signature.

PIKE ROAD FIRE DEPARTMENT PINK WITH A PURPOSE

The Pike Road Fire Department held it's first ever breast cancer awareness seminar on October 4, 2011 to commemorate breast cancer awareness month. To kick off the event, a dinner was held at the Station 1 on Wallahatchie Road followed by a presentation from Mrs. Kristi Springer, Clinical Services Director at the Montgomery Cancer Center. Mrs. Springer spoke to a room filled with Pike Road Fire Department first responders/firefighters and ladies auxiliary members. Each fire fighter was presented a pink Pike Road Fire Department t-shirt. Pike Road Fire Department personnel will wear pink throughout the month of October to memorialize breast cancer awareness.

Mrs. Springer said breast cancer awareness is much more than just working for a cure for breast cancer. It's also a time to celebrate the courage and determination of breast cancer survivors. Breast cancer touches all of us - women, and, yes, men too. Breast cancer is on the rise for younger women. People do not need a family history of cancer to be at risk. Mrs. Springer said the key to curing breast cancer is to catch it early. In recent years, there has been an explosion of life savings treatment advances against breast cancer. Individuals have treatment choices today. The decisions include surgery, radiation, hormonal therapy and/or chemotherapy. Mrs. Springer recommends you plan your individual treatment with your Oncologist.

The pink fire department shirts are available for sale for \$12.00 with proceeds going to the Wellness Foundation at the Montgomery Cancer Center. Citizens are encouraged to help support our Standing Strong campaign on the awareness and fight against breast cancer. Exciting things continue to happen for fire service training in Alabama. Thanks to the leadership and vision of the Personnel Standards Commission, we will take delivery of our second Mobile Fire Trainer this month and it should be in service by the end of January. The first unit, purchased two years ago, has proven so popular that we clearly needed to expand our fleet in order to have two trailers on the road delivering quality live fire training across Alabama. The Fire College and Personnel Standards Commission is very proud to join with the Rural Community Fire Protection Institute and the AAVFD to become a sponsor of the Annual Firefighter Appreciation Day. We had a great time in Monroeville this past summer (thanks to the Monroe County Association!) and we appreciate the chance to add our support to this event starting next year. We look forward to the 2012 event and the opportunity to help recognize the valuable work that is done day-in and day-out by Alabama's firefighters.

We are very excited to note that with your support, we were once again able to reach all 67 of Alabama's counties with training classes in 2011. As 2012 launches, we will press forward with the establishment of Regional Training Centers and Extension Centers, which will bring more training closer to you at home. We are also specifically targeting the development of new training experiences that will ben-

efit the volunteer fire service, and we will be working with AAVFD and a panel of volunteer fire chiefs

and instructors to make sure we hit the mark. Alabama does more firefighter training than most states, and it is your willingness to provide professional service that makes this possible.

A major focus for the coming year will be passage of a piece of legislation that will protect the future of fire service training in Alabama. Sen. Gerald Allen and Rep. John Merrill have worked hard over the past several

months to assemble a task force of fire service and other parties to determine how the Fire College and Personnel Standards Commission should operate in the future. AAVFD was represented on this task force by your President Chauncey Wood and District 3 Director Billy Doss. Their input was critical to the success of the task force, and the legislation that has been drafted will create a place on the Personnel Standards Commission for an AAVFD representative. This is a monumental step in our state fire service and they are to be commended for representing your interests. By passing this legislation into law, we will establish stability for our fire service training system and end the upheaval that has occurred every year for quite some time about the future of the Fire College. Most importantly, we will be able to focus on providing the training you need and not be distracted by political battles.

On behalf of the members of the Personnel Standards Commission and the staff of the Fire College, please have a safe and Merry Christmas and a Happy New Year!

LAWLEY VFD SECURES NEW TANKER THROUGH GRANT

The Lawley Volunteer Fire Department has taken delivery of a new 3,000 gallon tanker mounted on a 1998 Ford Chassis. The tanker has a 500 gallon pump, 3,000 gallon dump tank, 10" Newton swivel dump valve. It can unload from the rear or from either side of the tanker. This purchase was made possible by receiving a FEMA AFG grant in the amount of \$77,805. The grant was announced by a phone call from the office of Representative Spencer Bachus in January. This tanker replaced an old 1976 tanker that had outlived it purpose. The LVFD has an overall ISO rating of 6, made possible by passing a water shuttle test given by ISO. This new tanker will benefit the Lawley community in assuring the best fire protection possible. With the AFG grant program the department has been able to purchase up-to-date equipment and vehicles.

for ways for an in-line-of-duty death qualification for the grant, which is about \$360,000 PLUS education benefits for the family, there is a mentality of looking for 'loopholes' and reasons TO DISQUALIFY VOLUNTEERS! It appears that forces-to-be are influencing the attitude and stricter and narrower interpretations of coverage for Volunteers are being examined, followed, and used.

The State of Indiana is facing denial of coverage for certain in-line-of-duty deaths because of clauses in contracts for services. The clauses involve the Volunteer Fire Department being associated with a 'public entity' or as an independent organization.

Locally, OUR own AAVFD, along with the Joint Fire Council, is making preparation for the annual Regular Session of the Alabama Legislature. This year, the Session begins on Tuesday, February 7th. It must end no later than Monday, May 21st.

Our Fire Caucus Co-Chair Richard Laird has already prefiled OUR State AAVFD and County Volunteer Fire Association's 'Tax Exempt Status' and 'Workman's Compensation' legislation, which I will address in greater length in a future article. In addition, AAVFD will ask that Section 9-3-18 be amended so that VFD's receive AFC Transfer Title of loaned or donated equipment to said VFD, along with two other legislative bills of intent relating to a voluntary Check-off Program of Property and Fire Casualty to benefit our Alabama Firefighter Annuity and Benefit Fund, and a fire sprinkler system law.

These are but a few bills which OUR Association is introducing. A full slate of 2012 AAVFD legislation will be available in the January-March 2012 issue of 'THE VOL-UNTEER'.

In closing, I want to say a Great Big Ole' THANK YOU to Sandra Mott, Editor and Corey Carr, M.I.S. for the professional job you do with OUR newsletter and also to OUR own AAVFD "Paparazzo's" Rick Miller and Tina Wood for the awesome Conference and Firefighter Appreciation Day photos taken this past year.




