This course is designed to present the most current, specialized cave rescue techniques to those individuals, groups, agencies and others interested in or charged with the responsibility of performing high angle, cliff, pit, or cave rescue.

The course is presented in seminar form, using both classroom and field work stressing hands-on training. The instructional team will consist of HCRU Instructors.

This course meets the NFPA 1006, chapter 18 qualifications for Rescue Technician: Cave Rescue I/II

WHO SHOULD ATTEND

Any individual interested in developing the array of technical, medical and management skills required to conduct cave/cliff/high angle rescue. This includes personnel from cave rescue units, fire departments, rescue squads, emergency management agencies, park service personnel, first responders, and EMTs. Individuals not working for an agency are welcome and encouraged to attend.

COURSE TOPICS

This course covers all phases of cave rescue and management:

- Single rope technique
- Incident command system
- Underground environment
- Underground communications
- Cave specific medical considerations
- Response systems
- · Patient packaging and movement
- Hauling/lowering systems
- Vertical rescue
- Extrication techniques
- Pre-planning and logistics

EQUIPMENT NEEDED

All necessary equipment will be furnished with the exception of personal caving and safety gear. The following is strongly recommended to allow the student the maximum participation in the course:

- 1. UIAA /CE-Approved helmet, with chinstrap bracket (no fire helmets)
- 2. Three sources of light, with main source being mounted on the helmet
- 3. Sturdy, lugged-sole lace-up boots
- 4. Rugged outdoor clothing (no turnout gear)
- 5. Gloves with leather palms and full fingers (work gloves are fine)
- 6. Soft-capped kneepads (such as volleyball type pads)
- Personal first aid kit we will be outdoors, make the HCRU aware of any allergies (bees, poison ivy, etc)
- 8. Cash for lunches (not all places accept plastic)

Directors and Alternate Directors shall be elected by a committee consisting of one individual from each dues paid general member department from within the district (ONE VOTE PER DEPARTMENT PRESENT) at the general meeting.

First Responder Cabinet Added to Courthouse Hall

The Monroe County Fire Association has placed a cabinet in the Monroe County Courthouse to honor the first responders from all of the emergency agencies around the county.

The idea for the cabinet was born in July 2016 when the Fire Association hosted an event at Alabama Southern Community College to honor all first responders. In December, the County Commission would approve the cabinet as a new addition to the courthouse. B & B Cabinets, owned by Ricky Carnes, built it and it was placed alongside the Veterans Cabinet in the courthouse hall by Fire Association President Daniel Day and Rocky Hill Volunteer

Firefighter David Sims. County Commissioner Greg Norris was there to receive the cabinet on behalf of the County Commission office.

The cabinet contains objects, memorabilia and patches to represent the various departments from around the county, and in the near future a plaque will be added to the cabinet.

The plaque will be to honor the brave first responders who have fallen in the line of duty. It will include their names, the year they passed and the agency with which they were affiliated. Should anyone else die in the line of duty, they too will be honored on the plaque.

Chief Tracy Sanders was enroute, on 01/13/2017, to work on the departments SOG with a fellow member when the rescue truck she

was driving was struck from the rear by a tractor trailer. She passed away the same day at a local hospital from her injuries. Her love of the fire department and its members was only surpassed by her love for her daughters, granddaughter and family.

Her wish for you all would be to hold them tight, spend time with them and to thank you each for your sacrifice.

Chief Sanders started her pursuit of public service as a dispatcher with the Anniston Police Department. After several years she left the position but never could shake the desire to reach out and help anyone in need.

In 2006, she joined the Mt. Olive VFD. This was where she found her true passion and desire. Chief Sanders worked her way

> through the ranks and became the department's chief. She completed firefighter 160 and became a certified 160 instructor, while also becoming a nationally certified EMT. Her desire to see training completed led many at

the department to further their own education and left the department with numerous individuals certified in many disciplines.

Sanders was described as a star; she was physically and emotionally strong. She will be remembered for the impact she had on the Mt. Olive VFD.

From the Desk of

STATE FIRE MARSHAL SCOTT E DILGREEN

When I last prepared comments for the AAVFD Newsletter I had just assumed my new responsibilities as your State Fire Marshal. Nearly nine months have quickly passed since then. I would like to address a couple of items of importance, one new and one old and persistent issue.

First, effective on January 1, 2017 new building and fire codes were adopted. As of that date the new <u>state minimum</u> is the **2015 Editions of the International Building Code (IBC)** and **International Fire Code (IFC)**. For additional information go to our website at <u>www.firemarshal.alabama.gov</u>

Secondly, as I mentioned in my remarks late last summer, the occurrence of fire related deaths in Alabama continues to be an issue of great concern. Last year (2016) ended with a total of 115 persons losing their lives. As I type these remarks we've had 37 so far this year which, based on average, does not bode well for 2017.

I feel certain that you're like me and are constantly searching for the reason(s) why our great state seems to lead the nation in this terrible category annually. I firmly believe that the problem is multi-layered, in other words there is no one specific cause. What is sad is that the majority of these deaths occurred in residential settings and were preventable.

As I did last summer I am going to ask for help from all who may read this article. We must spread the message about fire prevention to everyone whether it's family, friends, co-workers, etc., the message must be clear <u>"Turn Your Attention to Fire Prevention"!!</u>



I'm challenging myself and my office as well as the fire service, both volunteer and career, and the public safety sector in general to increase our efforts in fire prevention and awareness. I remain convinced that only by getting people to re-examine their habits

and behaviors at home or where they work and play can we truly affect (reduce) the number of lives lost due to fire.

From the Desk of ... Matt Russell

So I'm standing in line at the Shelby County Courthouse in about 1992 waiting my turn to get my car tag when a lady, who appears to be an employee, comes stammering quickly from around the counter moving side to side through the crowd with purpose. She is whaling her arms, crying, and mumbling incoherently and, to my surprise, appears to be focused on me. In disbelief with my eyebrows raised and eyes as big as saucers I'm sure, I go into the linebacker stance-knees bent slightly with my arms out to the sides to keep my balance in case I have to move one way or the other quickly. I immediately look to the left and then to the right to determine if someone else might be the target of her indignation; no dice, she's focused on me. As she drew closer I was like a deer in headlights, confused, petrified, frozen and couldn't move. Sure enough, suddenly she's got me in her grasp and begins accosting me......

As it turns out two years prior I was a spectator at a high school football game in Winterboro, AL when an elderly gentleman in the crowd suffered a cardiac arrest. A few others and I removed him from the stands and began CPR. As an EMT Intermediate I continued treatment and accompanied the ambulance crew to the hospital. While en route the gentleman had spontaneous return of his pulse.

The lady who had moments ago almost caused me go into cardiac arrest who was overcome with emotion relayed that it was her father who was the gentleman who arrested at the football game and that she remembered me from the incident. She said that her father had lived for six more hours which allowed the family to call in their relatives to say their goodbyes. Once she composed herself, with all the sincerity and thankfulness she could muster, she said something that to this day when I think of this incident causes introspection, 'you don't know what that six hours was worth'. She emphatically exclaimed what I, for the past three years, had taken for granted, that some people have jobs, others have a calling.

When I recount this incident I am reminded of two adages. The first is that 'all emergencies are local', where you as volunteer firefighters not only abide, but flourish. The second is a quote from Winston Churchill who famously said "you make a living by what you get, you make a life by what you give." Having been blessed with the privilege of serving nearly 27 years with the Birmingham Fire and Rescue Service I have been compensated beyond measure. Not monetarily, but with the honor of forging life-long relationships while serving my community knowing that on more than a few occasions that if we had not been there the outcomes would have been much different. I am certain that anyone who has served as a firefighter can relate.

On the Alabama Forestry website there are at least 2159 fire departments listed. Of those approximately 175 are compensated monetarily (paid) in some capacity; the rest are volunteers. To the Alabama Fire College there is not a distinction between career and volunteer, there are only firefighters. Our vision, mission, goals, and objectives revolve around serving anyone in the emergency response community who chooses to partake of our services. Our desire for firefighters is the same regardless and that is to provide accessible education and training programs that positively impact response so that when the calls are complete firefighters/EMT's return home safely to their loved ones. The obligation of the Alabama Fire College is to instill in emergency responders the notion that training is the cornerstone of preparedness. The Alabama Fire College will strive to open the doors of education and training; our hope is that we have firefighters who reciprocate by entering.

Proposed Change to Certified Volunteer Firefighter Requirements

During the regular quarterly Commission meeting at the Alabama Fire College on Wednesday, April 19, 2017, a change to the requirements for being a **certified** volunteer firefighter was proposed. The change would add language in the Administrative Code 360-2-.01 dealing with this certification. This proposal would add "Prior to entering the certification course, the candidate must have on file with the commission a physical statement (AFC and PSC Form 05) from a physician licensed to practice in Alabama or such physician's designee."

Keep in mind this is a proposed change and will go through a process of advertising for and holding a public hearing on the change prior to

final adoption. The Commission unanimously felt that because of the strenuous demands placed on an individual during the course of this training, it was necessary to include volunteers in this policy that is already mandated for all other firefighter certification courses. This is not a requirement for a NFPA or DOT physical but merely a release from a physician stating you are physically fit to perform the duties required during this training.

The Commissioners ask that you please embrace this change as it will not only relieve our volunteer departments and members of liability, but more importantly it may also prevent a Line of Duty Death by identifying a problem before it is too late!

Alzheimer's Fire Service Training Recommended

Alzheimer's is an irreversible, progressive brain disorder that slowly destroys memory and thinking skills and eventually ability to carry out simple tasks.

The Alzheimer's disease epidemic continues to grow. As a first responder, it is critical to be prepared to face this disease in your community. People with Alzheimer's or another form of dementia can unknowingly put themselves and others in dangerous situations. Understanding the disease is key to ensuring you make the right response.

Many firefighters throughout the state see this disease impacting more families they serve. Training will help recognize a person who is confused and how to read their actions. Redirecting is the key.
